Demonstrate proficiency in the practice of scriptural principles in the content area;

Acquire a comprehensive management approach that enables them to perceive, assess, and make competent decisions in business and organization situations;

Articulate the complexity of interpersonal relationships in a business and demonstrate communication skills to motivate, support, coordinate and initiate action;

Analyze financial conditions of a business and utilize accounting, economic and financial principles and managerial judgment to develop plans and solve problems;

Apply, interpret and present mathematical analysis to evaluate operational decisions;

Articulate the requirements of human resource management and hold an appreciation of employees as the major asset of a business:

Demonstrate a level of computer information system knowledge that enables them to adapt to a business' electronic system and understand technologies throughout a business;

Evaluate the ever-changing work environment and the forces stemming from a cultural diverse society;

Enhance the interests of an organization's stakeholders;

Demonstrate an understanding of ethical responsibility in relation to the community;

Demonstrate a core of ethical standards that guide and direct decision-making and business behavior according to a high level of personal integrity.
